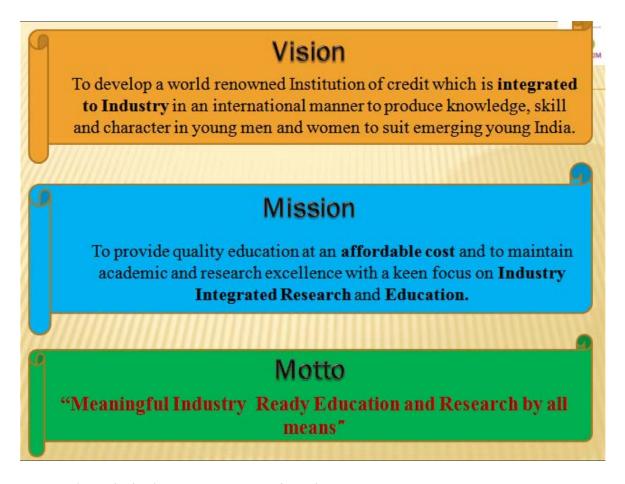

- Section of the Library is devoted to Periodical Section. Multi faculty Journals, knowledge based and general magazines, newspapers in various languages are housed in this section.
- CD ROMs covering literature and various other subjects are also provided in the Periodical Section of the Library.

### **Annexure III**

#### **Best Practice: 1**

#### 1. Title of the Practice

English Fluency through Mission Fluency – English speaking Culture

#### 2. Goal

To make the students to be fluent in speaking English.

#### 3. The Context

Students pursuing their studies are belongs to Rural background. The 60% of the students admitted are from Tamil Medium. The students feels very tough to follow the English medium. To enable them to learn English and provide a platform for the students to speak English through the English Fluency – Mission Fluency.

### 4. The Practice

Department of English has to frame set of English basic words around 450 for semester. These words are mapped with academic calendar. Each day 5 words would be practiced. The students are given the words in well advanced. They need to identify the meaning and frame a sentence for the 5 words. All the students will be assessed by the subject faculty. Through this activity, students are able to learn 5 words daily. In a semester they learn 450 days.

### 5. Evidence of Success

The success is measured through the group discussion, test and seminar. The student's fluency level is increased a lot. The final year students placement is increased and the feedback given by the employer is highly appreciatable.

#### **Best Practice: 2**

#### 1. Title of the Practice

Add-on Course to students – to enable them technically sound and to provide additional knowledge to students which were not taught in curriculum.

#### 2. Goal

Each department aims at training the important job skills to the students through various certificate programmes, thus enabling them to acquire an additional certificate during each semester along with their semester mark sheets. Students can pursue these certificate programmes along with their regular papers. All the students have to select a course during the beginning of the semester. The course will be conducted for minimum of 30 hrs after the class hours.

#### 3. The Context

Add-on course is the additional course offered to the students studying in I, II, III year. The classes will be conducted with 80% practically and 20 % as theory. The sessions will be handled by the faculty member of the department / expert from Industry. The classes will be conducted after the class hours for a minimum duration of 30 hrs. During the beginning of the semester, the HoD of the department has to announce the course offered in the semester for the second, third and first year. The syllabus, duration, handling faculty should be submitted to IQAC. Once the course was completed by the student, they have to undergo the online examination. If they cleared the examination, they will be given the certificate.

#### 4. The Practice

Department of Commerce offers – SPSS and Online Accounting courses as add-on Course opted for the students of Commerce, Commerce with CA, Professional Accounting.

Department of Computer Science – C#. NET, PHP, 3D Max, Maya were the courses offered for the students of CS / IT / CT / BCA.

Department of Mathematics – Latex, MATLAB were the course opted to the students of B.Sc. Maths, B.Sc Physics, M.Sc. Maths.

Department of Visual communication – Photoshop, Coreldraw, Adobe After effects were the courses offered to the students of B.Sc. Visual Communication.

### 5. Evidence of Success

The students actively participate in the course and 92% attendance is maintained during 2016-2017. 90% of students received their certificate.
