They can access internet services on their personal devices including tablets, laptops and mobile phones thereby performing various computing tasks easily and efficiently.

The Department of Computer Science also conducted exhibitions on various innovative and useful software available as free or open source on the internet. Software which can be helpful in day to day life are showcased in the exhibition and interested faculty members were provided copies of these software, free of cost. Also the department of computer science conducted a Faculty development programme on the usage of Google Apps for Class room administration and Paper less office administration.

The faculty members of the Department of Computer Science are encouraged to help students and faculty members of other departments in their endeavour to update their technical and computing skills.

The faculty members of other departments were apprised of various time saving techniques and tools which can be very helpful in their research and publication related activities.


